## "Looking for Answers"



Does it seem to y'all that this undertaking has a universal quality to it? It seems so to me, and clearly to the Cohen brothers in their movie "Oh, Brother, Where Art Thou?" in which more than one person appeared to have "r-u-n-n-o-f-t" looking for answers. Perhaps this is an activity that may only be carried out by those with resources such as time and money, or maybe it is motivated by a particular philosophical or theological perspective. Let this be the focus of our worship and fellowship on Sunday, December 29th when Rev. Heather Collins will be our preacher.

Rev. Heather Collins' full time ministry is directing the Chaplaincy Services and the Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) Program at the Atlanta Medical Center, a Level I trauma center in downtown Atlanta, where she has served for ten years. On January 1, AMC consolidated with South Fulton Medical Center in East Point, GA and is now certified for 762 beds. Heather is responsible for the provision of pastoral care, and the education of clergy at both the main and south campuses.

Heather began her ministry in the parish and originally moved to Georgia from NC when she was called as the first full time minister at the UU Congregation of Gwinnett. This congregation ordained Heather in 1995, and she served there until 2000 when she entered the field of professional chaplaincy and pastoral education. Heather was certified as a CPE Supervisor in April 2011, a good year made even better year when she and her sweetheart, David Bowen, married the following month. Heather and David, a professional musician (playing for us this morning?), share their home in Loganville, GA with two dogs (Molly and Suli) and two cats (Emmett and Mist).

### **Building Your Own Theology**

The Lifelong Learning team is pleased to announce that we will offer a "Building Your Own Theology" seminar beginning in January. The ten-session course, developed by Richard Gilbert, is "based on the assumption that everyone is their own theologian. The program invites participants to develop their personal credos: the fundamental religious beliefs, values and convictions that inform and direct the living of our lives. Gilbert poses various developmental tasks in which participants come to terms with human nature, ultimate reality, ethics and religious meaning." 
them in the basket by the Tom May table when entering the Fellowship. Any contribution will be much appreciated.

#### Save Your Garbage, Please! Our 7th Principle Lives!



Did you know that more than 75% of the topsoil that existed worldwide when Europeans first colonized America is now gone and much damage has been done to the water cycle by cutting our forests? Since 1950 the U.S. has lost one third of its topsoil. The excessive use of commercial fertilizers only adds to the problem and the use of commercial pesticides and herbicides poisons our land, water, food, and our people.

There is one simple thing we can all do to address this problem. The UU vegetable garden uses no commercial pesticides, herbicides, or commercial fertilizers. This gardener is on an ongoing quest to help nature build good organic top soil for the garden—by hauling horse manure, raking and adding leaves, and turning in kitchen scraps: vegetable peels, coffee grounds, egg shells, fruit remains. In fact, I added some of our aged compost to make a new garden bed today. I need your help though to add sufficient nitrogen ("greens"). Surely you are not all depositing your kitchen scraps in personal compost piles? Please help make my task easier, and, more importantly, give back to the Earth, thereby completing the cycle. Save your kitchen leftovers (no meat or processed foods like bread, pasta) in a container with a lid and bring it to the Fellowship whenever you come—toss it out back into the compost pit that says "Compost Here Please". Nature's processes, with a little help from me, will do the rest and you may taste the results at the next monthly potluck. And take a stroll through the garden, where life is always better!


