## "Atheist Spirituality" Martin Landegar (Video)



Dr. Marlin Lavanhar presents "Atheistic Spirituality" in a video presentation which he originally shared at All Souls Unitarian church in Tulsa, Oklahoma. It will be the first video sermon for our congregation.

All Souls has three services: Humanist, Traditional and Contemporary, in which he shares the same message with three different perspectives. In this humanist presentation he makes a distinction between Spirituality and Religion and Signs and Symbols. He provides his definition of what it means to be "spiritual", how humanists and theists differ in regards to spirituality, and how we are all interconnected. He also points out how we each hear words, especially religious words, through our own understanding and what to do if these words interfere with our relationships with others in our congregation.

Lavanhar is the senior pastor of the largest Unitarian Universalist Church in the United States. Marlin grew up as a Unitarian Universalist in Illinois. He majored in Sociology at Tulane and graduated with his Ph.D. from Harvard Divinity School. He is the youngest senior minister of a major congregation in the denomination.

After receiving his bachelor's degree, he taught English and American Culture in Kyoto, Japan for two years. He followed that with a three year around the world bicycle trip, studying Buddhism in Asia, Hinduism in India; Jewish, Christian and Muslim traditions in Israel, and cycling through much of Asia, the Middle East, Eastern Europe and North America. Along the way he visited and wrote about Unitarian communities on the Island of Negros in the Philippines, in the Khasi Hills of Northeast India, and in Pakistan, Sri Lanka, the Czech Republic, Hungary, and Rumania.

## "The Path of Liberation" Billy Thomas

Guided by the words of The venerable Bardor Tulku Rinpoche, in his book "Living in Compassion", I would like us to consider the "path of liberation". Rinpoche says that "The basic situation we find ourselves in as unenlightened beings is that we are caught up in duality of self and other." This self and other line of thinking speaking and doing, causes a difficult cycle of dualism. We experience things and people that we are attracted to and people and things that we are repulsed by which creates a



division. I would like to offer that there are ways that we can be our natural selves, and practice a path that leads us to a more peaceful, meaningful existence with ourselves and others. I believe what the world needs most, right now, is a big dose of WE or US verses SELF or OTHER.

Billy has a BA degree from Stetson University, an MA from The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, and post graduate hours in counseling from the University of North Florida. He is an Academic Counselor at Florida State College at Jacksonville and the Director of the Karma Kagyu Study Group in Yulee Florida. He lives in Yulee with his wife, Rachel, and their two children, Amelia and Teddy, both second graders.

## "Why Confronting Injustice and Seemingly Insurmountable Odds is Not a Waste of Time"

## Jeff Nall

Drawing on his experience as an activist, public lecturer, professor, and father and friend Dr. Jeffrey Nall contends that many people of various ages and education levels respond to mounting injustices and ecological crisis with fatalistic resignation and cynical defeatism. Dr. Nall addresses the flawed basis of an attitude he believes is not only counterproductive to social change but also dehumanizing. Nall contends that many fail to account for the way in which our moral commitments are about much more than achieving particular "end results" or "victories"; they are core components of our self-identity and define us as individuals, too. Articulating a virtue ethics approach to social change, Nall contends that the question is not simply, is change possible, or is wholesale societal change possible? An important and too often overlooked question is what kind of person do you wish to be? And to what are you ultimately committed to?

Jeffrey Nall holds a master's of liberal studies from Rollins College and a Ph.D. from Florida Atlantic University. He is an adjunct professor at two colleges where he teaches philosophy, critical thinking, and gender studies. Nall is the author of Feminism and the Mastery of Women and Childbirth: an Ecofeminist Examination of the Cultural Maiming and Reclaiming of Maternal Agency During Childbirth (Academica Press, 2014). ## **Great Decisions**

7:00 p.m., Monday, January 5 at the UU



The Great Decisions discussion program is the center piece of the Foreign Policy Association's education outreach efforts. The group meets at the UU at 7:00 p.m. on the first Monday of each month and discusses different topics related to US foreign policy.

#### Monday January 5, 2015, at 7:00 p.m.

In November 2013 as calls for closer ties with the EU failed to be met, Ukrainians took to the streets. As the Euromaidan movement pulled western Ukraine closer to its European neighbors, Russia has threatened to tear away the country's eastern half. Putin's pushback against European expansionism has us wondering: If Putin's Russia isn't afraid to take an aggressive stance against Europeanization in Ukraine, what does that mean for the rest of Russia's neighbors?

#### Monday February 2, 2015, at 7:00 p.m.

The idea of "privacy" has undergone significant changes in the digital age, as has the idea of privacy "harm." The founding fathers granted citizens significant protections in the Constitution. Now, concerns about what some see as a U.S. "dragnet" and unwarranted privacy intrusions have compelled other countries to revamp their own privacy protections. Is "privacy" as we know it dead?

Essentially Great Decisions is a learning exercise. Consensus is not our goal. Everyone's point of view carries equal weight and everyone is encouraged to share their opinions and ideas.

#### **Our Teen Program**

They have completed three of the principles, and we look forward to sharing the final project with the congregation at the end of the year. Barbara Battelle engaged the teens in a discussion about Creation Theory and the Theory of Evolution, and how the Theory of Evolution is not incompatible with religion. We welcome two new teachers to the teen program – Diana Hull and Vanessa Friedman, who are both lifelong Unitarian Universalists.

#### **Teen Program Coordinator**

Diana Hull has offered to coordinate our teen program. We are excited about her enthusiasm and ideas for engaging our teens. Diana has participated at UUFSA for about four years, and has two young children in the program. A tremendously influential time in my life was the years spent in the Youth program. As a member of Ohio Meadville Young Adult Committee (YAC) I planned, organized, and orchestrated weekend conferences for youth, from food service to vespers service. Those years were a powerful part in forming my adult persona. As I result I am inspired to enable teens to share in their larger church heritage. In volunteering with the youth of the fellowship I hope to explore the world faiths in an effort to define better our personal interests as well as what drives those around us. I intend to build relations with other youth groups in Orlando and Jacksonville as well as the district in general. I look forward to witnessing today's youth benefit from the religious support I was afforded years ago at such an instrumental developmental stage.

#### **Teen Sleepover at UUFSA**

In April, we will be hosting a sleepover of about 25 teens from UUFSA, Orlando and Buckman Bridge. The purpose of this event is to explore sites that illustrate UU Principles. ## **Care Connection**




Our Care Connection group provides short term support and assistance for members of the fellowship during times of difficulty.

#### HOLIDAYS AT THE FOOD PANTRY



Your generosity continues to help sustain the Food Pantry for those who depend on it for food on their plates. This is true throughout the calendar year and yet somehow it seems more critical than ever over the Holidays. I think part of that is the emotions that run high this time of year, including gratitude for family, friends, and loved ones. We also pause and consider our blessings including a roof over our heads and the material necessities of life. The contrast of people who don't even have a place to call home or who have bare cupboards is pretty grim this time of year. That is why it is more important than ever for us to give thanks for our full plates by helping those who need the basic necessities for survival. But then I am preaching to the choir since, after all, the UUFSA has been generous in making donations and contributions to the Food Pantry throughout this year.

Just to share a couple of statistics, the bag count at the Food Pantry was 14% greater in November than this time last year. A record was set for the number of bags given out in one day at 54. The need continues at a somewhat accelerated pace, with an expected increase in December. There is no better way to give thanks during this Holiday season for our countless blessings than to give to those who need our help.

Remember, too, that cash is always welcome. Just give your cash donation or check made out to the UUFSA with a note that it is for the Food Pantry, to Ruth Weber, UUFSA Treasurer and she will get it to the Food Pantry on your behalf. You can also use PayPal. This extra step documents UUFSA generosity on our own records.

A reminder that some of the Food Pantry resources have disappeared and we can continue to donate items like canned meat, cereal, pasta/sauce, dried beans, rice, and soup, to help replace donations from Nourishment Network.




