The concept of death and rebirth has been a spiritual theme which appears in many religions, predates Judeo Christian thought, and continues to capture the imagination of human beings, with its message of new life, redemption and salvation. A historical, psycho-social and musical exploration of these ideas will be presented by transformed newcomers to our St. Augustine congregation, Uncle Eddie & Robin.

Uncle Eddie & Robin have just moved to the St. Augustine area, and immediately joined our congregation. They are a husband/wife musical duet most recently arrived from Wheeling,

West Virginia, where they performed an eclectic mix of classic rock, bluegrass and original music. Ed was an icon on the Appalachian music scene, having performed there for over 40 years, and having the honor of being a member of the staff band of the legendary Wheeling Jamboree. They have two original CD's: "My Own Words" and "When We're Together", and are working on their third. They are also social and environmental activists, having founded the Wheeling Water Warriors, organized the Great Ohio River Relay, and attended Occupy Wall Street and the People's Climate March in NYC. Robin is a graduate of Hunter College of CUNY with a BA in psychology and sociology. She also holds a Master's in Social Work from Adelphi University, as well as additional post-graduate training at the University of Pittsburgh in Social Work and Public Health. She had a private mental health practice for 15 years in Washington, PA. She is a lifelong UU, and was involved on the Board of Trustees at the Ohio Valley Unitarian Universalist Congregation in several capacities, as President, Vice-President, and Trustee. She is a mother of four. Uncle Eddie & Robin have conducted services and performed at numerous UU congregations throughout the Midwest and Northeast, and are scheduled to perform at the upcoming Universalist Convocation in Jacksonville at Buckman Bridge UU Church in May. "A Chosen End" Mark Yount



Mark recently experienced the death of his father, who was a self-proclaimed "nonpracticing agnostic." He will offer a personal and existential reflection on end of life choices and honoring life to the end.

Mark Yount taught Philosophy for 12 years at Trinity College (Hartford), Saint Joseph's University (Philadelphia) and Jacksonville University after earning degrees in Philosophy from The College of William and Mary (B.A.), Villanova (M.A.) and University of Colorado at Boulder (Ph.D.). He has given numerous sermons at Buckman Bridge UU Church (Jacksonville) and served as YRUU/Beacon youth advisor for over a decade.

Downstairs Dialogue "Free Speech and Political Correctness" Sunday, April 12, 9:15-10:15am, Downstairs

Is Free Speech really free? Should it be limited? If so, how? And by whom? One limit suggested by some is called Political Correctness, which can be defined as "speech that is not offensive, especially to minority or disempowered groups".

This month in our Downstairs Dialogue, we will address these issues at various levels – international, national, state and local. For example: What should be done about worldwide Muslims' opposition to depictions of the prophet Mohammed in popular media? Why should President Obama's administration avoid the term "Islamic terrorism"? Should Oklahoma University dismiss students because they sang a racist chant in their fraternity? And right here at UUFSA, are there limits to what can be said to the visiting speaker at "Talk-Back", or to each other at the coffee hour?

These are interesting, complex, and practical questions. Let's see if we can come up with some consensus answers, or at least ideas about answers. Discussion led by Charlie West.

The Rev. Jack Ford is a fellowshipped minister with the Unitarian Universalist Ministerial Association. He has been in UU ministry for 21 years serving in the Florida district. He is also a carpenter and a lover of nature. He was recently selected as minister of the Buckman Bridge UU Church.

UUA Regionalization and the Florida District Decision Meeting in Orlando April 18

At a recent Downstairs Dialogue, we discussed some major organizational changes that are now being made in our Unitarian Universalist Association, with the purpose of improved efficiency and effectiveness. At the national level, UUA headquarters operations in Boston have been consolidated into a single, updated building, replacing several old, outdated structures at different locations. The UUA Board of Trustees, our elected representatives who govern the UUA, has been reduced in size from 26 to 13 members, with improved group dynamics and effectiveness.



Following these changes, the intention is to accomplish similar improvements in the field organization of the UUA. These changes are referred to as "Regionalization", and the plan is for them to be implemented first in our Southern Region, one of five UUA regions, which covers states and districts from Virginia to Texas, including Florida.

The planned changes will involve the consolidation of the UUA professional field staff into a single team, serving the entire region. This replaces the former cumbersome arrangement whereby staff members were funded and supervised jointly by their respective district boards and also by the UUA headquarters in Boston. The new Southern Region staff team will be led by Rev. Kenn Hurto, Team Lead, whom many of you will remember from a workshop and sermon here at UUFSA several years ago. UUFSA will have its primary connection with the Southern Region staff through Maggie Lovins, whom many of us have met and who is helping us with our ministerial search.

Under this plan, all field staff will report to, and be funded by, the UUA in Boston. The former district boards will cease to exist as independent governing and funding entities. These changes, which have been extensively discussed and agreed to by all the district boards in our Southern Region, will be voted on by District Assemblies, meeting simultaneously in Orlando FL; Montgomery, AL; Greensboro, NC; and New Orleans, LA on April 18. Linked together through the wonders of electronics, delegates will be addressed by the Rev. Dr. Peter Morales, President of our UUA denomination. And later, the vote to make the changes to implement Regionalization will be taken. (We in Orlando will be fortunate to have Peter with us in body as well as in spirit, both for his important keynote address and at a reception the previous evening as well.)

All interested UUFSA members are invited to attend this important meeting in Orlando. This would be a wonderful nearby opportunity to meet our UUA President, and participate in this historic occasion. After solicitation for delegates in the February Quest, the board has chosen Charlie West and Beverly Cree to represent UUFSA in Orlando. We are authorized one more delegate, so any member interested should contact Cherie Dolgin immediately.

At Orlando, in addition to the morning keynote address and business meeting, there will also be afternoon workshops on Youth Ministry, Stewardship, Midweek Programming, Change Activism, Environmental Justice, and the Second Annual Meeting of UU Justice Florida.

Living our Chalice Verse






Our Care Connection group provides short term support and assistance for members of the fellowship during times of difficulty.





Transgender and Intersex Issues

On Thursday evenings in April at 7 p.m., BBUUC's Welcoming Congregation Ministry (WCM) is sponsoring a series of discussions about issues experienced by the transgender and intersex communities. Since the organizers need to confirm attendance to schedule a facilitator (especially for weeks 4 and 5), please reply to John Giordano privately at lgbtq_welcoming@bbuuc.org if you have interest or plan to attend. The planning and structure of the presentation sessions depends upon attendance.

- April 2 *Gendernauts*, A *Journey Through Shifting Identities* (87 minute movie) A look at the world of transgender identity as seen through portraits of some gender mixers. Whether by birth or by choice, sometimes with the assistance of hormones or surgical procedures, meet those who blur the lines of male and female.
- April 9 *Red without Blue* (movie). *Red without Blue* is a documentary about the indestructible ties of family. The film chronicles the close, yet sometimes strained relationship between identical twins Mark and Alex as Alex undergoes a transformation into a woman a named Clair.
- April 16 *Toilet Training* (approx 30 minute movie) and "Intersexion" (movie) "Toilet Training" addresses the persistent discrimination, harassment, and violence that people who transgress gender norms face in gender segregated bathrooms.
- April 23 Planning a presentation from a medical professional with discussion afterwards. Precise/specific content of presentation not yet confirmed.
- April 30 Planning a persentation from trans and (hopefully) intersex individuals. Discussion afterwards. Presentations not yet confirmed.

Joint District Assembly April 17-19



On April 17-19, there will be a joint district assembly of the districts in the Southern Region to discuss final dissolution of the districts as part of the change to the new regional structure.
