

THE FOOD PANTRY: OPEN FOR BUSINESS ALL SUMMER

As you may know the SJEM Food Pantry is open 12 months a year in order to accommodate those who avail themselves of its services. Your UUFSA volunteers continue to support this worthwhile outreach program through the heat, humidity, and sans hubris for those who depend on it for support. I noticed that the Fellowship also made a cash donation of \$255.00 in May, which is greatly appreciated. And to those individuals who make cash donations, a big thank you as well.

Your donations help SJEM help those who need it the most in our community. Total donations from the participating churches and their membership for May were \$2,708.50, The April total was over \$4000.00; however, every donation is gratefully accepted. Also the USPS carriers conducted their annual food drive in which the Food Pantry was the fortunate recipient. What a pleasant greeting when the drive ended of row upon row in every room of the Pantry brimming with those donations! Please thank your postal carrier for their generosity at a time when the cupboards were close to bare. The increase in homeless families with children is a reality, as well as those households that barely keep roofs over their heads. The Pantry fed 235 families in May. So YTD the Pantry distributed to 343 in January, 231 in February, 281 in March, and 302 in April, for a total of 1,392 families! These figures make it abundantly clear that we are on a winning mission.

You are invited to make your cash donation or check made out to the UUFSA with a note that it is for the Food Pantry, to Larry Cowart, UUFSA Treasurer (there may be a new Treasurer by now so proceed accordingly) and she will donate it to the Food Pantry on your behalf. You can also use PayPal. This extra step documents UUFSA generosity on our own records. Finally, you can also make a donation with a gift card.

A big thank you to those of you who continue to bring food to the UUFSA for the Food Pantry as well. Remember if you give one item, make it jams/jellies to go with peanut butter (in excellent supply at the moment) which is a favorite of children from 2 to 102. Also, The Pantry depends on your continuing to provide items like canned meat, cereal, pasta/sauce, dried beans, rice, and soup, to help replace donations no longer coming from Nourishment Network.

Our volunteers for this month for UUFSA include Dave and Lee Ann Forrest, John Porter, Nana Royer, Cherie Dolgin, Cal Marshall and Pat Maguire, and me. Cal Marshall and Pat Maguire also continue to be food shoppers for The Pantry whenever there is a fifth week in the month. Cal and Pat, and all of our volunteers deserve our special thanks so when you see them let them know how much they are appreciated. Thanks to all of our volunteers and to all of you who contribute food and/or money to help sustain this dynamic outreach program.

Are you interested in volunteering for the Food Pantry? We cover the second and fourth Fridays of each month, from 1 to 4p. 
Movie

Beyond Our Congregation

Friendship Association Concerts in Havana

In celebration of the imminent normalization of diplomatic relations between the US and Cuba, ten St. Augustine musicians will travel to Havana under the auspices of The Friendship Association. In Havana, this premier group of musicians will perform five goodwill concerts in support of a grassroots community project that promotes the inclusion of children and youth suffering from Down syndrome and other intellectual disabilities.

The concerts will encompass unique American music genres including Blues, Jazz, Traditional and New Americana, and Folk presented from the unique perspective of “La Florida” and the influence of St. Augustine. In Havana they will have opportunities to interact with Cuban musicians to explore not only the differences, but also the many similarities of our musical culture and over 450 years of growth and progression.

For this people-to-people initiative, the Friendship Association (www.staugustine-baracoa.org) has partnered with the Down Syndrome Association of Central Florida (www.dcacf.org), and Sociedad Civil, the community-development branch of the Office of the Historian of Havana. Representatives from the Down Syndrome Association of Central Florida will accompany the musicians.

The Havana-based project, Quinta de los Molinos, will accommodate up to sixty challenged youth and their families. These families will be selected each year from different municipalities throughout Cuba and will be offered training and occupational therapy. Therapy will include music, art and theater, community-gardening, psycho-dance, social skills training, and sports.


