From Your Minister

Twice a year the tilt of the Earth's axis is inclined neither away from nor towards the sun. At that time, the sun's rays fall perpendicular to the earth's rotaional axis. We call this an equinox, which is derived from the Latin aequus (equal) and nox (night), because at the equinox, night and day are equal in length over the entire globe. As if you needed to be told, the spring equinox arrives this month marking official beginning of Spring. Personally, I don't need a calendar to know that. Every Spring I get the insatiable drive to be in nature, go hiking, camping, anything to be outside and in nature.



Since time immemorial, people have marked the passage of the seasons with rituals and celebrations, in recognition of our internal and eternal connection with the natural rhythms of time and space. In the words of Alan Watts, our ancestors fully recognized that "We do not "come into" this world; we come out of it, as leaves of a tree. As the ocean "waves," the universe "peoples." Every individual is an expression of the whole realm of nature, a unique action of the total universe."

When we are paying attention, when we are awake to our internal and eternal connection with the natural rhythms of time and space, all illusion of permanence is destroyed. It is the folly of our species that we so often cling to the delusion of permanence. Why is that when all of nature reminds us that change is the order of things?

Imagine, a completely static universe? Imagine that Yin and Yang, darkness and light, hot and cold, male and female, good and evil, what if everything in the universe were so perfectly balanced that nothing ever changed? Life as we know it would end if this were the case. Ocean currents would stop. Winds would stop. The seasons and all weather patterns would cease. If we did not first die from hunger and thirst, we would surely die of boredom if everything that makes life interesting, if everything that drove the evolutionary process suddenly ended. We may fight it, we may rail against it, we may try our hardest to deny it, but change isn't simply inevitable, it is foundational to life.

As Spring emerges, we again celebrate the many new members that have joined our Fellowship and we will begin our stewardship campaign to fund our mission and our vision. The time for planting the seeds of growth and change is now! The future of this Fellowship, the future of Unitarian Universalism, is in your hands.

Paul Wise was born in Athens, GA where his mother carried him to term while finishing an English degree at the University of Georgia. His father was pastor of a Southern Baptist church in Athens. The hospital was located near the church, so it wasn't long before he started attending.

Paul was always interested in literature and was skeptical from an early age, studying the Sunday school lesson with the aim of asking embarrassing questions that would stump the Sunday school teacher.

He wrote poetry, taught himself to play guitar, began attending the University of Georgia, dropped out, went to Europe, where he stayed for a year, making money playing and singing in the streets, cafes, and folk clubs of Geneva,



Paris, Zurich, Frankfurt, Cologne, Basel, and especially Bern, where he first felt it. Actually the first time he felt the Bern was while staring at a flower for about 6 hours while lying in a garden in Geneva. Later, he returned to the US, went to university for real and eventually ended up with an MA and PhD in English literature. Paul is an associate professor of English at South Georgia State College. He has a child and two grandchildren, and is married to Jackie Rock, a local artist.

Food Pantry January 2016



January figures show an upswing over December of last year, at 443 bags distributed, while the December number was 404. Your UUFSA volunteers continued contributing their time and efforts in assisting those who came for help by giving freely of smiles and good will along with the food bags. The Pantry fed 312 families, 470 adults, 259 children total in January, which is a worthwhile effort in which we can take pride in creating a reality as a valid outreach program. That distribution included 11,712 meals that could have meant the difference between being fed and going hungry. There were 5,672 bags or 135,948 meals distributed in the calendar year 2015. Recent and/or pending cuts in food stamps most likely signify that we will get increased requests for Food Pantry assistance this calendar year

The Pantry still welcomes the monetary contributions made by the Fellowship members, and friends, as well as the actual food donations collected at the UUFSA. Food with long shelf lives continues to be the ideal choice. However, since we still have a bread shortage at this time, bread product donations are also welcome. The Pantry also needs canned fruit. We continue to rely on these donations to ensure the shelves are stocked. Monetary donations are routed through the UUFSA Treasurer Larry Cowart and you can continue to make checks payable to the UUFSA with a note that the recipient is to be the SJEM Food Pantry.

The Pantry is partnering now with Haven Hospice and I will share details as they become available. We will be posting Grief Counseling notices in the Pantry for those who may need their services.

Your star volunteers at the Pantry are: Cherie Dolgin, Lou and Jill Cerulli, John Porter, Nana Royer, Lennie Gemski, Kathleen Paracer, Cal Marshall, Pat Maguire, Dave and Lee Ann Forrest, Chris Fosaaen, and me. Everyone worked hard and made this a successful program. Cal and Pat also picked up additional volunteer duties as purchasers again this year, for which we extend a special kudo.
