From Your President



Dear Ones,

The pace of life at our Fellowship has gone from merely busy to breakneck speed, it seems, as so many events and challenges have come our way. We are growing, we are evolving, things are changing, and this is all good.

You may have noticed our **new mailbox on Florida Ave.** Our mailing address, as you will see elsewhere in the Quest, is now 2487 A1A South, St. Augustine FL 32080. We have had our PO Box downtown reinstated after a snafu with payment, so we have it for another 6 months, but mail will be forwarded to the street address beginning April 25.

However, unbeknownst to us, there was a period of a couple of weeks during which our mail was being sent back to the senders, so if you sent mail to the PO Box, it will not have reached us. Especially if you mailed in your pledge, expect to see it returned to you and please, please do try again.

Speaking of pledges: our stewardship program is evolving along with the rest of the Fellowship. In the past, we've made our pledges and then the budget was developed. This, we find, is backwards and especially as we grow, we need to do things differently.

For many years, the officers, the Board of Trustees, and the committee chairs could manage Fellowship operations. As we have come into compliance with the IRS, for example, or even practices of the UUA, we have found many jobs increasing in complexity, and we can see we can't handle things any longer the way we used to. We have added the cost of a part time bookkeeper to our budget, and we have added childcare positions. In response to many years of comments about music, we have added the cost of a quarter-time music director to the budget as well. This means our budget is 27% higher than it has been, and the result is that our pledges must be 27% higher as well, if we want to fund all the things we've said we wanted.

We ourselves, of course, are the ones who will decide what we can do together, what we can accomplish. Please consider your pledge carefully, and remember, you are pledging for 2 things. The white pledge card indicates what you want to contribute to the running of the Fellowship. The green pledge card indicates what you want to contribute to paying Rev. Tom for his excellent work with us. If you're new to the Fellowship you may not know we had an anonymous donor who gave matching funds for the support of the minister. The first 3 years, the congregation must match a \$15,000 donation. That is what the green card is for. It indicates what you can contribute toward the goal of \$15,000. Only when we reach that goal do we get the matching funds, so please remember that when you return your pledge cards.

The **Pledging Deadline is May 8.** This is because the Board meeting is May 9 and that is when we will set the budget to be voted on at the May 15 Annual Congregational Meeting.

I can't emphasize the importance of this enough. If you haven't already submitted your white and green pledge cards, please give them in a sealed envelop, to Larry Cowart, Treasurer, or Dave Perkins, Asst. Treasurer. You can also give your cards to me or to our Stewardship Chair Chuck Chambers. If you receive your cards in the mail, you can return them to our street address, 2487 A1A South, St. Augustine 32080.

Thank you so much. I know we will continue to create a place in our Fellowship that serves each of us and the wider community. So be it.

Food Pantry



In March the Food Pantry continued its mission in the St Johns County community of providing food for those who need it. Your UUFSA volunteers were up to the challenge in every way as they faithfully donated their time, food, and efforts with generous hearts and pocketbooks. You can be confident that the volunteers who staff the UUFSA commitment dates represent you in a very positive light. March is the latest food distribution figures assimilated and they are as follows: We disbursed 315 bags, which fed 245 families comprised of 348 adults and 135 children. So this outreach program is still alive and kicking! The figures continue to be consistently higher than a year ago. We still assist people who are homeless as well as those who have no visible means of income in this program.

The Pantry depends on monetary contributions made by the Fellowship members, and friends, as well as the actual food donations collected at the UUFSA. The volunteers brought extra food also in March to stock up on canned fruit, and we owe them a special thank you for that effort, again above and beyond. Food with long shelf lives continues to be the ideal choice. The Pantry still needs canned fruit as well. We continue to rely on these donations to ensure the shelves are stocked. Monetary donations are routed through the UUFSA Treasurer Larry Cowart and you can continue to make checks payable to the UUFSA with a note that the recipient is to be the SJEM Food Pantry.

The Pantry is partnering now with Haven Hospice. No new information yet on that enhancement. I believe Grief Counseling notices are now posted in the Pantry for those who may need their services.

Your star volunteers at the Pantry are: Cherie Dolgin, Lou and Jill Cerulli, John Porter, Nana Royer, Lennie Gemski, Kathleen Paracer, Cal Marshall, Pat Maguire, Dave and Lee Ann Forrest, Chris Fosaaen, and me. Jerome Fosaaen also joined us to cover for Chris. Thank you Jerome! Everyone worked hard and made this a successful program. Cal and Pat also picked up additional volunteer duties as purchasers again this year, for which we extend a special thanks.
