From Your Minister

It has now been one complete trip around the sun since I began my work here as your minister. As some people already know, I will be living much closer to the Fellowship and so will be able to more fully participate in the life of the community. Given all the activities we have coming up this Fall it will be very helpful to be living so close. Besides the annual Water Service on September 18, we are helping to organize an interfaith event and in October we will be holding the Mission Workshop that was postponed last Spring and we are participating in "Make a Difference Day." This is what it means to be a small and mighty congregation.



Working with the Interfaith Community of St. Augustine, we are organizing a Faith in Action Forum to discuss faithful responses to

hatred and violence. The instigation of this event is the September 20th airing of the Ken Burns documentary "Defying the Nazis: The Sharps' War." The movie tells the story of Rev. Waitstill and Marsha Sharp who left their home and children in 1939 to help Jews and other refugees trying to escape Nazi persecution. Acting from their Unitarian beliefs, the Sharps risked everything to help faceless strangers living thousands of miles away. More information will be published once it is finalized.

Last Spring the Fellowship approved the hiring of a Music Coordinator. Interviews are taking place this month and we expect to have the position filled by October. I am impressed by the high level of qualifications of the candidates and I don't expect it to be an easy decision but I am confident that our music program will be greatly enhanced. "Music is a moral law. It gives soul to the universe, wings to the mind, flight to the imagination, and charm and gaiety to life and to everything," wrote Plato. I am grateful for all of musicians, volunteers and professionals, who have given wings to our minds and flights to our imaginations. The position of Music Coordinator is not intended to replace our current music program but to enhance it and I look forward with high expectations to this new collaboration.

Adults often forget the innocence and naivete of childhood, and indeed, we could learn many things from observing and emulating some of the things children do. We might just be happier people!




Sunday, September 18, 10:30 a.m. "Water Communion" Rev. Tom Schmidt

Treasurer's Note

Bookkeeping — A Friendly Reminder — When writing checks for Donations, Pledges and MRF Pledges etc.

We want to thank the vast majority of the congregation who already fill out their checks in the manner requested below but because we are now using a bookkeeping company to handle our monies (e.g. registering donations, pledges, bills etc) we are asking everyone to follow these guidelines. Of course, the Treasurer deposits all the cash and checks into our accounts at Harbor Bank. The Bookkeeping Company doesn't handle any cash (i.e. they are only informed as to the amount of cash) and they only work with copies of checks.

In order to avoid confusion regarding checks please always write your checks to "UUFSA". Also, it would help if you would write "Pledge", "MRF Pledge" or "Donation" on the memo line as appropriate and please DO NOT place more than ONE item on the memo line. e.g. either a REGULAR pledge or a MRF pledge; either DWD or Pledge or Donation --- please avoid COMBINING items on one check --- write two checks or three as the case may be.

Third Sundays --- On the third Sunday if you wish for your check to be given to the designated Non-Profit organization for that Sunday please write out the check to "UUFSA" and then write the name of the organization on the memo line e.g. Food Pantry, Home Again, etc. for that specific Sunday only and that specific organization only. We will combine the total of the checks and cash and make out a check for that specific organization. If you don't write anything on the memo line it will be considered a regular donation for the Fellowship unless specified otherwise e.g. pledge. On Sundays other than the third, please do not write the name of a Non-Profit organization on the memo line since we would need to generate a specific check for that organization for only your check. A preview of the film was presented at this year's General Assembly, with the Sharps' grandson, Artemis Joukowsky in attendance.

Given the current political climate and divide, this film is very timely. We hope many of you will be able to view it on PBS, **September 20, 9 pm.**



Members of our team can help you with that, if you like. The children gain so much by getting to know YOU! Moreover, we guarantee, you will be enriched as well.
