


From Your President

Greetings!

For the past year and a half, this fellowship has for the first time used the services of a paid, professional Unitarian Universalist minister, Rev. Tom Schmidt. It was time for the membership to decide whether half time paid professional ministry was meeting the needs of the fellowship. Although it was within their parameters to make this decision themselves, the Board decided to bring this choice to the larger fellowship, as it was felt the whole congregation's voice needed to be heard, and they needed to "own" this decision.

Earlier this year, facilitated by the tireless work of Trustees Chuck Chambers and Pat Maguire, the Board held a number of small group





Not surprisingly, as UUs, this clearly tells us that there are striking differences of opinion on these important issues. For some leaders, they might see this as a congregational crisis, indeed, in my past, I have seen a congregation fractured by such controversial decisions.

However, we are taking an optimistic stance, and instead of viewing these events as filled with risk, we choose to see this as another chance for members of the fellowship to see an opportunity for more involvement with their spiritual family. Whether as greater stewardship in the form of a greater pledge or more cash donations, which enable us to continue the programs which you have told us you want in our congregation, or by stepping up our volunteerism. As always since moving to St. Augustine, I like the maritime reference: If you are concerned about where our UUFSA boat is going, please jump on board and help us steer and do the important work of this beloved community. The Board and I welcome your support.

From Your Minister

As we draw this "church year" to a close and prepare for our summer programming, we find ourselves at an interesting crossroads. The Fellowship has voted to support professional ministry beyond the initial three-year contract that brought me to Florida. Since the original goal of my ministry here was to help make that happen, then clearly we can name my time here a success. The fact that I will not be that minister is ultimately not as important as the Fellowship moving forward with a unified vision of who you are and what you want to be.



I do want everyone to know that I do not take personally the decision of the congregation that I am not the best fit to lead the Fellowship

beyond my initial contract. Your vote makes it clear that where I feel called to lead, much of the Fellowship does not wish to follow. Ultimately, it is for the best that we face that fact now rather than later, and it will help you better select the right minister for you going forward. I will support the effort to find a new minister in every way I can, and I hope everyone who has supported my ministry here will do the same. I sincerely hope that you find the best minister for the congregation, one that will help this Fellowship thrive for many years to come.

In the meantime, the life of the Fellowship moves forward and we have much to do. The Stewardship drive continues and we are at 75% of our goal. The congregation approved a bold budget at the annual meeting and to move forward responsibly, the Stewardship Team needs to hear from you. Your decision to accept the proposed budget is a commitment to support existing and proposed staff and programs. Your pledge of financial support makes everything we do as a congregation possible including our expanding music program and hiring a part-time teacher/coordinator for our children's program.

I believe Unitarian Universalism and this Fellowship have much to offer the world. This does not mean we have all the answers or that our way of being religious is the best or only way. What I believe we get right, what is unique about this movement of ours is that it is always moving, always changing. This is possible because we have not anchored ourselves to a creed that might limit our potential. The problem is that the inverse is also true: we do not have an anchor to keep us secure in tumultuous times. While this insecurity may create some discomfort for us, it isn't necessarily a bad thing. Think of that discomfort as a wave and that

we have a choice about what happens next. Do we avoid the wave and quickly duck underneath the water until it passes, safe until the next wave comes along? Do we stand in place, daring the wave to knock us down? Or do we ride the wave to see where it might take us?

What is sacred space and how does how it impact modern religious adherents--Unitarian Universalists, Reform Jews et al., and what are the implications of the Biblical 'Holy Land' viewed through the lenses of Judaism and modernism?

Rabbi Fred Raskind graduated from Boston University and attended Columbia University, where he studied philosophy and comparative religion and at three Christian Divinity Schools: Boston University, Union Theological Seminary [NYC], and Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary. After being ordained by Hebrew Union College in New York, Rabbi Raskind spent the next ten years serving Reform congregations in Greenville, SC and then in Athens, GA, along with Hillel College Campus ministry.

For 15 years, he commuted from Atlanta to serve part-time small congregations in Gadsden and then in Anniston, AL. He has been involved in interfaith and outreach work throughout his career. Rabbi Raskind advised and helped start two congregations and has done Executive consulting in the Atlanta area. He is a Licensed Professional Counselor in Georgia.

In 1999, he became full-time spiritual leader of Temple Beth Shalom in Vero Beach, and then served as interim Associate Rabbi at Hollywood's Temple Solel. In 2003 he assumed the pulpit of Congregation B'nai Abraham in Hagerstown, MD and was Jewish Chaplain at the Veterans Administration facility in Martinsburg, WV for two years. Rabbi Fred and his fiancée Judy arrived in St. Augustine in August, 2013. Since then he has played an important role in community and interfaith activities.


Reverend Teal specializes in eco-theology, the human-animal bond and all their healing aspects. She is the Spiritual Director for The Ministry of Animals.



Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of St. Augustine (UUFSA) is accepting applications for a **Teacher/Coordinator for our Programs for Children and Youth**

This position is designed to help expand our on-going Programs for Children and Youth. The Teacher/Coordinator will teach classes and coordinate programs for our children and youth consistent with Unitarian Universalist principles. The position will require 12 hours per week (average), including Sunday mornings, in-office meetings with the minister and one meeting per month with the team supporting our children/youth programs. The appointment will be for 40 weeks/year with a start date of August 1, 2017.

We are seeking someone who has the following qualifications:

- Knowledge of (or is willing to learn about) Unitarian Universalism and a respect for our values and traditions.
- Excellent communication and interpersonal skills.
- Advanced computer skills including word processing, data management and social media.
- Experience with planning and implementing programs and activities.
- A valid driver's license.
- Is 21 years of age or older.
- Some knowledge of child development is highly desirable.

Job Summary

The Teacher/Coordinator for Children/Youth Programs will work independently with the support of members of the Children/Youth Program Team and will report directly to the minister. The Teacher/Coordinator will be responsible for planning and implementing programs for our children and youth and will be expected to teach classes on Sunday morning except for one Sunday per month. Program responsibilities will include:

- Curriculum/activity selection, planning and adaptation.
- Materials and space preparation.
- Implementation of UUFSA policies especially related to child safety.
- Coordination and supervision of childcare.
- Coordination of special events involving children.
- Volunteer recruitment and support.
- Regular communication with parents and support for parents.
- Regular communication with the broader Fellowship to inform them of Children/Youth Program activities.
- General administrative tasks including budget development and monitoring and record keeping.

To apply, please submit a cover letter describing why you are interested in this opportunity and any relevant experience. The Black Stallion


Friday, June 23, 6:30 p.m.
