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From Your President

Greetings!

Thank you all for your vote of confidence in asking me to serve a second term as your President. It is an honor to serve the good people of this fellowship. I do not regard the position or the tasks involved as a chore. I consider this to be sacred work, and I find joy and fulfillment in this participation.

I am grateful to all those who felt similarly, who preceded me, and who were instrumental in laying the groundwork for this very special community of people. Like many others, there have been times in my life that were very stressful, where I felt I could just barely put out all the proverbial fires going on in my life. Those



were the times it was easiest to put aside spiritual practice as something extra, not a necessity of life. Every time I did that, I found that things seemed to fall apart. But when I took the time to take care of my spiritual house, everything else seemed to fall into place. Time and again, I have found this to be true, and part of my spiritual exercise has been in service to members of my spiritual family.

The first time I came here just under three years ago, I was delighted to find a wonderful group of devoted, compassionate members who tirelessly support this fellowship. I am so grateful to them for all the things they do, from serving as committee chairs and service leaders, to silently and without complaining taking care of such small details as getting us a new teapot, changing the battery in the clock in the back of the sanctuary, to purchasing new altar cloths, to changing a flickering light bulb. Nevertheless, it is clear to me that many in our community are perhaps not aware of how much their help would be appreciated. As the old saying goes, "Many hands make light work". At this time, I am asking all of you to take the time to reach out, let us know your passion, and how you'd like to participate in the work of creating sacred space and a warm home for all who pass through our doors.

The story of the Little Red Hen comes to mind, where the title character asks for help from all her fellow barn animals in every aspect of the process of cultivating, processing and baking bread- "Not I" said the duck, "Not I" said the cow, "Not I" said the pig, was the catchline. Apparently they all thought the Little Red Hen could do it herself. Perhaps she hit them all on a bad day, but it seemed the poor bird only found interest when it was time to eat the bread. This is sometimes a source of frustration and burnout to the Little Red Hens of many a good organization.

Figuratively, in this fellowship, we have planted in the Spring. As the Little Red Hen illustrates, we cannot idle away the Summer and then expect to reap in the Fall. There are special skills and active involvement and engagement and money that we require to keep our house in order. There is always work to be done, and there are bills to be paid. I have always enjoyed alliteration as a way of both enjoying our language, and providing mnemonics to encourage

messages to remain in people's minds and hearts, so I share this one. We actively and fully participate in this spiritual family by lending our Talents, Time and Treasures.

I encourage each of you to reach into your spiritual heart, and recognize your part in baking the bread which this family of diverse, yet like minded, people need to thrive and grow. If you have a TALENT which can be helpful to us, and that would bring you joy to share, please let us know. Maybe you don't sing or dance, but cab you swing a mean hammer or paintbrush, or cut down a dead branch with the greatest of ease? We love to learn more about our fellow members and their passions. No talent is too large or too small, if it saves us from paying someone else to do, it is a great service to all of us.

If you have TIME to offer, let us know what you enjoy doing with your time, what makes you feel that your time is worthwhile. Perhaps you feel good comforting and supporting the ill, feeding the homeless, teaching our children, greeting new visitors, gardening, beautifying. And certainly, we appreciate any TREASURE, the donations which financially sustain our daily operations and programs. You support our building, facilities, speakers and activities with your cash contributions. Your pledges are critical to keeping the doors open.

Finally, I'd like to ask each of you to consider what it would mean to you if this fellowship was not here in Northeast Florida for you, or for others like you in the generations to follow. What would it be like if there was no safe sanctuary for people of liberal religious leanings? What would it mean not to have a place to gather with the people who become like family to you, who share your thoughts, values and dreams for a just society? The indigenous people of this land believed that every decision had to include the seven generations that followed, we also want to provide a solid ground for those who will follow us in this beloved community. Working together, we build upon and reinforce a strong foundation for the future.

From Your Minister

As we move into our summer programming and many of us begin to wander near and far, please keep the Fellowship in mind and collect water to share with the congregation at our annual Water Communion in the Fall. For those new to Unitarian Universalism, the Water Communion serves to bring us back into beloved community following our summer travels. When possible, collect small amounts of water from places significant to you and in the Fall we will blend our collected water into a common bowl that includes water from previous years and will again be saved for future services.

Like the Flower Ceremony we celebrated in June, the Water Communion is, above all, a celebration of community. Both rituals invite us to reflect on how our individual gifts and offerings are amplified when we work together in

service of something greater than ourselves. Our Fellowship exists because a small group of people came together with a vision and a commitment to make it happen. We the inheritors of that commitment are now the stewards of the vision for the generations that follow us. To help this Fellowship thrive well into the future it requires our continued commitment and a bit of courage.

Commitment can take many forms but one of the most important at this point in the life of this Fellowship is the commitment comes in the form of a pledge of financial support. Most of us have already made such a pledge, but for the Board to plan responsibly for the future it needs everyone's participation so that it will have a solid foundation from which to make decisions. A search committee is being formed to find your next minister, we are working on achieving Welcoming Congregation status, and we are adding another staff position for our growing children's program, so your commitment is essential to make our collective vision come to fruition.

Like moths to a flame, humans are drawn to places of transition. Beaches and shorelines, sunrises and sunsets, spring flowers and autumn leaves, they call to us. In such places and times, we seem more open to the still small voice within that reminds us that we are alive, that we are one with all that we see. We have entered a time of transition for this Fellowship, one that has the potential to be as special and transformative as we choose to make it. We cannot just assume this will all work out for the best any more than we can assume it will end horribly. As Unitarian Universalists, we embrace a free and responsible search for truth and meaning. Because assumptions are, by definition, things we accept as truth without any evidence, to assume anything is to cease our searching and is grossly irresponsible.

In my first talk as your minister, I told the story of the Chinese farmer who in a short time had several "bad" things happen that lead to "good" results, which then lead to more "bad" things to happen. Though his neighbors and friends got caught up in the emotional roller coaster of all the good and bad, the farmer maintained the attitude of "It could be good, could be bad, too soon to tell." This is where a responsible

search for truth and meaning leaves us, withholding judgement so that we are open to what the next moment might bring. As Soren Kierkegaard said, "Life is not a problem to be solved, but an experience to be lived." I am looking forward to what the next year will bring and hope the members and friends of UUFSA all do the same.

Great Decisions


