From Your President

Namaste!

This month spring arrives in all its glorious splendor, the seasonal symbol of life beginning anew. In a few short months, we will again return to the status of a lay-led fellowship, a big change for many of us.

According to Hans Selye, Austrian endocrinologist, change can be perceived as positive or negative. Regardless of this, change produces stress in individuals and, taken to a larger level, in any system or organization. Stress is “the non specific response of the body to any demand for change.” It is very difficult to define, as it is subjective and varies from individual to individual. There is no yardstick by which to measure it. In his later years, Selye said, “Everyone knows what stress is, but nobody really knows.”



I was always amazed when I worked with loving couples in therapy to find how convenient it was for partners to lash out at each other, rather than bond together, in response to changes from the outside world. I reminded them that they were each others best allies in addressing the stress that both of them felt.

Similarly we are all together in a state of change and stress.

Remember, we are all in covenant with each other at UUFSA.

So, I am asking all of us to stop and consider the acronym, “THINK”, before you speak to a member of your spiritual family with whom you are in covenant.

Is it:

T - Truthful?

H - Helpful?

I - Inspirational?

N - Necessary?

K - Kind?



If your thought passes all those tests, speak your peace. Speak gently with one another as we work together to create a healthy collaboration and continue to grow a meaningful place of fellowship. Spiritually and emotionally, we grow through our positive reactions to change and adversity.

Minister's Musings

Our stewardship campaign is a time to renew lost or strained relationships and plant the seeds of a brighter future. I am pleased the Stewardship Team has chosen to meet with members and friends in small groups and face to face encounters because Stewardship is more than fundraising. While fundraising is critical to maintain the external requirements of our Fellowship (staff, maintenance, utilities, insurance, etc.), the real work, our mission, is wholly relational. The building and all that goes with it exists to facilitate the development of community and the expansion of human relations. As the Stewardship Campaign progresses, I strongly encourage everyone to participate most fully. Your active participation is at least, if not more important, than your pledges.

As we prepare for the annual Stewardship Campaign, it seems appropriate to remind ourselves why we joined this community of faith in the first place. Included in our new member ceremony are these words: "We are not only members of the interdependent web, we are also the keepers of that web, we are each called to serve the web of life, to serve the greater good, to serve each other in the creation of the Beloved Community." This being the case, it could be argued that everything we do as a Fellowship is stewardship in one form or another.

Tom Owen-Towle, UU minister and author, makes that same point in his book *Growing a Beloved Community*. He writes that we are all called to be stewards of our world, our society, our friends and families, and ourselves. Stewardship in this context, is growing, advancing, and building the gifts that life has given us. Stewardship explicitly recognizes that even though we are not the authors of creation, we are co-creators of our own reality. We create this reality not merely through our thoughts and dreams, but through our actions; we are what we do.

This month, as we begin our Stewardship Campaign, I hope you will consider how this Fellowship embodies and promotes your values. I invite you to share this with others through the small group meetings while learning what is important to others in the Fellowship. Through this sharing of ourselves and the sharing of our gifts, know that you are not being just good stewards of the church but also the world, our community, and yourself.

Dr. Clark has also pastored Spanish and English-speaking congregations, most recently First United Church (UCC) of Tampa. Warren Clark and Pam Brown have lived in St. Augustine for five years. Warren is active in Compassionate St. Augustine, starting initiatives on criminal justice reform and environmental justice. Warren and Pam's leadership of the St. Johns Solar Cooperative led to receiving the Green Hero of the Year award from the U.S. Green Building Council of N.E. Florida. An historical illustrator, Warren's images are used in classrooms across Florida.


“The impacts of believing the fantasy of ‘away’”



Budget Workshops and Pledge Drive in March

A series of small group budget workshop meetings will be held in March. Members will have an opportunity to meet in a structured small group to review the preliminary budget passed recently by the Board for the next year (July 2018 - June 2019). The Stewardship Team will be presenting these workshops to give each member an opportunity to learn and ask questions about the upcoming budget. Details of dates and times for these workshops will be announced soon. Your input at these workshops will be used by the Board in determining any needed changes to the budget to be presented to the Fellowship at the Annual Congregational Meeting on May 20th. The Stewardship Committee will be following up with all members individually on a pledge for the upcoming year during March. This is a transition year for the Fellowship as we revert to a lay-led Fellowship. Your support is vital.

Programs for Children and Youth



Our children were delighted to report that our Fellowship raised **\$847.62** during the **Guest at Your Table** fundraiser for the UU Service Committee. This money will help support the UUSC's human rights work around the world. Thank you for your generosity!

In their classes, our children continued to think about charitable organizations that serve our society. Our children were invited to select the charity that will receive donations from our Share the Plate during the month of February. They first thought about all the different needs our society has and identified what type of effort they would like to support. Then they selected a local charity focused on that effort. They decided they wanted to support organizations focused on the care of animals, and they selected **Ayla's Acres No-Kill Animal Rescue, Inc.** In addition to being a no-kill animal rescue organization, Ayla's Acres is a sanctuary for more than 200 "unadoptable" domestic and farm animals. It is also currently developing "*Peter's Friends Animal Resource Center*", a 20-acre property in St. John's county that will focus on the rescue, care and adoption of cats and dogs.

Each month, our children will continue to collect food from members of our congregation for the Ecumenical Food Pantry. We thank all in our Fellowship for their active participation in this effort to feed the hungry. With these activities we hope to make our children aware of our society's needs and to instill in them the fundamental idea of giving.



Bending Florida Toward Justice

Members Mary Kellough, Claudia Atkins, Nana Royer, and Friend Marsha Williams made a road trip to Tallahassee January 22-23 to attend UU Justice Florida's Legislative Days.

We dined at the UU Tallahassee church and listened to dynamic keynote speaker Desmond Meade speak just hours before it was official that there were enough votes to get the Voting Restoration amendment on the Florida ballot. Desmond is the person responsible for heading up the campaign to restore full citizenship rights to ex-felons who have paid their debt to society and are free people. After his release from prison he went on to obtain an education, including a law degree; however, he has heretofore been unable to practice law due to his lack of voting rights.



The next day we visited our legislators' offices, lobbying for bills which UUFJ supports as being reflective of our spiritual values. We also sat in on a couple of committee meetings, which was most enlightening. Ask one of us one thing we learned. You may be surprised.

We are now lobbying our congregation to make an annual contribution, at \$1.00 per member. Congregations that support the work of UUJF will be listed on their honor roll.

Welcoming Restrooms

We are announcing some minor changes to our restrooms, which will take effect on April 1st.

Several years ago, working toward the goal of being ADA (Americans with Disabilities) compliant, we adapted our facilities to include a ramp for wheelchair access to both the front and back entrances/exits. Although both of our restrooms have grab bars for handicapped usage, neither is so labelled at this time.

As we move toward becoming more welcoming to families with young children and infants, we need to provide an appropriate changing table for babies.

As we move toward the goal of becoming a UUA recognized "Welcoming Congregation", we are faced with several tasks. In addition to being a host for our local PFLAG chapter, providing Sunday services and other activities for the LGBTQ community, we will be making some alterations to the configuration and labeling of our restrooms.

Presently we have signs on our restroom doors which indicate "Women" and "Men". At this point in the life of our congregation, we are unable to shoulder the very significant financial investment in adding another restroom to accommodate all these diverse needs. Members of our Buildings & Grounds and Beautification Teams have come up with a clever and cost saving compromise as follows:

- 1- The current "Men's" Room is being converted to a single use "Family" restroom. There will be a lock inside the restroom on the door which leads to the hallway. The large flat area will be adapted for the installation of a changing table for babies. The signage will reflect "Family" restroom and also indicate handicapped accessibility.
- 2- The "Women's" restroom will remain the same as it is presently, with a change of signage to reflect "Handicapped Accessible".

We affirm the inherent worth and dignity of all those who come through our doors. Thank you for your cooperation in helping us to recognize and appropriately respond to the diverse needs of this welcoming fellowship.

Great Decisions



Geopolitical allies and challengers alike are paying close attention.
