Sunday, July 1, 10:30 a.m. First Principle: "The inherent worth and dignity of every person" Ray Adman

Ray will present his beliefs about "Practicing Inherent Worth and Dignity: Keeping it Real." Each person is assumed to start life with equal inherent worth and dignity. What happens after that determines our judgment of their real inherent worth and dignity. Murderers, dictators, sociopaths: Inherent worth and dignity? No. This principle applies only at the start of life, not later. We are not forced to believe that all people have inherent worth and dignity regardless of what they do. An equal start, not an equal finish, is the basis of the UU First Principle.

Sunday, July 8, 10:30 a.m. Second Principle: "Justice, equity and compassion in human relations" Ed Mahonen"

The Second Principle addresses the need for a spirit of cooperation and an acceptance of diversity. Many spiritual sensibilities, while advocating these goals, in fact cultivate division, an 'us' vs 'them' mentality. The extremely fragmented culture we live in would benefit from more 'Second Principle' type thinking.



Sunday, July 15, 10:30 a.m. Third Principle: "Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations" Ruth Weber

Our third principle calls on us to accept one another and encourage spiritual growth. How can we create a community in which people with what appear to be incompatible needs and beliefs can not only accept each other, but invest in each other's growth and development?

What happens when we disagree? Does one of us have to leave? What if one person's approach to spiritual growth is an irritant to someone else? How do we accommodate everyone's needs?

In this service, we hope to share our personal experience with examples of how we have helped others on their spiritual journey and, equally important, how we can accept each other when acceptance is a challenge.



Sunday, July 22, 10:30 a.m. Fourth Principle: "A free and responsible search for truth and meaning" Michael Read

In today's world of social media platforms "truth" and "meaning" have become so obscure as to signify whatever one chooses. Consequently, freedom of thought and speech has become drastically abused. Today, the importance of a RESPONSIBLE search for truth and meaning is of utmost importance.

Sunday, July 29, 10:30 a.m. Fifth Principle:

"The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large" Jerome Fosaaen

Democracy, I think we can all agree, is under considerable stress right now. By the time you are reading this blurb in the Quest, who knows what new transgression(s) will have occurred or been revealed? However, some of the more dangerous threats to our democracy include the Supreme Court decision known as Citizens United, and gerrymandering in the age of Big Data, in which congressional districting can be done so precisely that the party who controls it every ten years now picks the constituents for its candidates rather than the other way around.

And then there is Donald Trump, currying favor with Russia's Vladimir Putin and fawning over other autocrats around the world while swinging like a wrecking ball through the alliances with our closest democratic allies. Did Russia and other foreign influences swing the 2016 election? Russian Troll Farms certainly made use of social media to advance Trump's chit during the primaries and to spread lies and divisions during the presidential campaign. Cambridge Analytica, a British firm, but with ties to Russia, apparently gave material support to the Trump campaign in micro-targeting ads in social media.

In office, Donald Trump has been non-stop in breaking norms and attacking any entity that opposes him in his narrow "us vs. them" world view. Is this what democracy is about? After cataloging in the briefest possible way the numerous threats we are watching unfold before us, I will offer some thoughts upon the nature of democracy, and then invite your thoughts in an extended discussion afterward.

Jerome Fosaaen became a Unitarian-Universalist in 1974, after hearing the Rev. Charles White-McGehee deliver one of his eleven "Watergate Sermons" in Jacksonville. He moved to Saint Augustine in 2001 for work and is a past President of the Saint Augustine Fellowship.




Sunday, August 5, 10:30 a.m. Sixth Principle: "The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all" Yosi McIntire

Yosi will speak on "Discernment, Clearness, & Decision-Making: How does Quaker faith & practice work itself out in their lives and actions?" The Religious Society of Friends (Quakers), rely on a process of centering down and waiting for inward guidance. Their decision-making discipline enables them to set aside both individual egos and normal group dynamics, so that they can discern and give voice to diverse perspectives on a concern, and can come to unity on a choice—one which represents, not majority will or even consensus, but rather the shared "sense of the meeting." That is, a commitment to a collective way forward, whether or not this choice suits each of them individually.

Sunday, August 12, 10:30 a.m. Seventh Principle: "Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part" Palmer Short

Our seventh Principle, respect for the interdependent web of all existence, is a glorious statement. Yet we make a profound mistake when we limit it to merely an environmental idea. It is so much more. It is our response to the great dangers of both individualism and oppression. It is our solution to the seeming conflict between the individual and the group.

As we transition back to being a lay-led community, we explore what it means to share our selves with our spiritual family. 
Water Communion Sunday, September 16th
