From Your President



Participating: to be active in something; to take part; to share in something.

The more you participate in something, the more you get back. We all know this. But our lives are often so full that it seems we can't squeeze another activity into the schedule. We know that participating in a voluntary activity is usually fun. We feel good about the activity and often make and strengthen friendships. When we make the time to participate in something new, new paths open. We learn new things and meet new people.

"But I'm so busy I can't take on another thing. My schedule is full." But is it? I am often reminded of the simple science lesson we may have all

seen and heard at some point. But it bears repeating.

The teacher takes an empty jar and fills it to the brim with rocks. "Is this jar full?" asks the teacher. Some in the class answer that the Jar is indeed full. Others are quiet. Then, the teacher adds a sizable amount of fine – grain sand into the jar, filling the spaces around the rocks. "Now is the jar full?" asks the teacher again. More of the class now says that the jar is finally full and laugh about how they were fooled. A few remain quiet. Then the Teacher takes a cup of water and proceeds to add it to the jar, filling the spaces around the grains of sand. "Now the jar is full" says the Teacher. "There is often room for more."

Is your life like the jar filled with just rocks? Maybe some sand? Full, yet probably room for some more? Use some of that empty space in your jar to participate in something new. The UUFSA offers many activities in which you can participate. Each one you choose will pay you back. You know this to be true, but inertia may be keeping you tied to the old routine. It is as simple as reading this Quest with a seeking eye, looking for something that interests you, something you have been wanting to do. Go to a movie. Work for social justice. Sign up for hospitality duty. Attend a committee meeting (you are always welcome, you know). Help clean the highway. Throw a dart. Attend an adult education class. And much more.

But we all find reasons we can't. We have other responsibilities. We don't know anybody in that activity. We don't know who to talk to about getting started. We don't know enough about it and don't want to look ignorant. Somebody else will want to do that and you wouldn't want to push them aside. We are too old. We are too tired. We have this or that other reason that keeps us comfortably in the same old rut even though we complain to ourselves (and maybe others) about being bored, about feeling empty, about wanting to make new friends.

As Woody Allen said so many years ago, "Showing up is 80% of life." You have already shown up by being at the UUFSA. Being part of the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship means having the opportunity to participate in many varied activities with many interesting people. Don't be shy. Don't make excuses. Don't forget there is always more room in the jar.



Mother's Day in the US was first officially celebrated in 1908, to honor the mother of Anna Jarvis, a peace activist during the Civil War. But honoring those who gave birth to us is not a novel concept, nor is the loving sentiment confined to our actual birth mothers. This service will explore our sacred relationship to mothers. Through science, we know we are all made of stardust, and through our spirit, that we are golden. Sometimes we forget these sacred origins.

Robin is a graduate of Hunter College of City University of New York (CUNY) with a BA in psychology and sociology. She also holds a Master's in Social Work from Adelphi University, as well as additional post-graduate training at the University of Pittsburgh in social work and public health. She had a private mental health practice for 15 years in Washington, PA. She is a lifelong UU, and has served as an officer on the Board of Trustees at the Ohio Valley

Unitarian Universalist Congregation as well as here in St. Augustine. She is a mother of four.

Robin and her husband Ed, as "Uncle Eddie & Robin," have conducted services and performed at UU congregations throughout Florida as well as nationally. They are also social and environmental activists, having founded the Wheeling Water Warriors, organized the Great Ohio River Relay, and attended Occupy Wall Street, the People's Climate Change and Standing Rock.




Sunday, May 19, 10:30 a.m. "Adams and the Amistad" Barbara Brenner

The story of the Amistad Mutiny has been told and re-told. Still, the saga of the band of the captive black Africans who won their freedom in the US is so rich in humanity, so revealing of the political, social, and religious life of the time, that there's always more that can be told.

Barbara Brenner will present a dramatic retelling with special focus on the role of Unitarian Abolitionist John Quincy Adams, his personal relationship with the Africans, his famous defense of them in the Supreme Court and what happened after. Barbara is a writer and educator with a special interest in American history. She's the author of more than 75 books for children and adults, among them "If You Were There in 1776," and "Wagon Wheels," a true story about the founding of the first all – black community in Kansas. She moved to St. Augustine from Pennsylvania in 2010 and became a Unitarian Universalist shortly thereafter. She says that this presentation partly came about as a result of her

The New Budget

The budget for next fiscal year (July 2019 – June 2020) will be voted on at the annual meeting of the Fellowship on May 5^{th.} The pledge drive has raised about \$54,000 for next year. Those who attended the budget workshops or have looked at the tentative budget adopted by the Board will recall that we hoped for Pledges of \$58,000 as a minimum. While we hope for some additional pledges to come in yet, we will be short of the amount we had hoped for.

The Board adopted a tentative budget at their April meeting to present to the Fellowship. A copy of that budget was emailed or mailed to each Member. It is based on pledges of about \$54,000. It is a balanced budget. We do have about \$500 more in pledges since the budget was balanced. The changes made to the tentative budget presented and discussed at the budget workshops are summarized as follows:

- The publicity line item was reduced from \$7,000 to \$1,000.
- Leadership training has been reduced from \$500 to \$0.
- Green Sanctuary has been reduced from \$400 to \$200.
- Building enhancements were eliminated.

The remainder of the budget is as previously presented. The budget as proposed will be tight but it will work. We will try to answer any questions you may have at the annual meeting.

"The Meaning of Life" Wisdom and Knowledge from the World's Great Intellectual Traditions Thursday, May 9 and 23, 5:30 - 7:00 p.m.

On May 9th We will be focusing on David Hume's Skepticism and the Place of God. Hume argues that God may not be accessible to reason but this need not matter to us. We can choose to have a theological life or we can choose not to if we want. The break between reason and faith forced an emphasis on the primacy of the individual and rise of rights. The doctrine of **foundationalism** emerged, the idea that we know things because of our observations or by reasoning, not through scriptures

On May 23rd, the central theme is Friedrich Nietzsche's idea of creativity and

authenticity and that we lead our lives as great novels or works of literature which we leave behind as worth living.

He launched the movement called **Postmodernism**, which questions the sovereignty of the individual and rejects the idea that human history is progressive. For Nietzsche, a meaningful life is one of authenticity, in which we create our own goals and values and live up to them.
