Sunday, June 2, 10:30 a.m. "Unpacking White Supremacy" Rev. Phillip Baber


Service Leader: Richelle Ogle Music: Alex Soltow Story for All Ages

He is also a former co-president of I.C.A.R.E., the Jacksonville-based Interfaith Coalition for Action, Reconciliation, and Empowerment. Phillip's ministry is dedicated to the advancement of our collective liberation, leading him to advocate in support of criminal justice reform, police accountability, racial and economic justice, justice for refugees and immigrants, and LGBTQIA+ rights. Phillip's faith calls him to



boldly declare that Black Lives Matter, No human is illegal, and women's rights are human rights.




Sunday, June 9, 10:30 a.m. "Growing Up, Not Out, and Other Ideas for the Future" Adam Morley

Imagine loving your children so much that you would walk, bus, and pay a shady human smuggler your life savings to take a precarious, dangerous, and challenging thousand plus mile journey to a hope of safety. On this Father's Day, Cal Marshall and Pat Maguire will discuss their recent experiences at the southwest border, volunteering with asylum-seeking migrants after their release by US ICE (Immigration and Customs Enforcement). These migrants await their asylum adjudication hearings.

Calvin Marshall and Patricia Maguire are members of our fellowship. Cal is a retired emergency room nurse, and Pat is Professor Emeritus at Western New Mexico University.

We are also celebrating our "Flower Communion" today. The Flower Communion is a traditional UU ritual that celebrates beauty, diversity and community. Everyone in the congregation brings a flower and places their flower with all the others in a shared vase. Each person takes home a different flower than the one they brought.

Men and women face many challenges integrating back into the community after incarceration. This has led to a national epidemic of recidivism* and adversely impacts the already disadvantaged communities to which they return. To break this cycle, the formerly incarcerated need a second chance to gain sustainable employment and the social skills to become productive citizens. There is a solution that works with a 20-year track record of reducing the recidivism rate in half.

The mission of Operation New Hope is to provide support, and life and job skills training to the formerly incarcerated and place them in employment that offers a sustainable quality of life. Community partners and the judicial system motivate and move individuals to become productive, responsible citizens within the community.

Caren is the Executive Director and Founder of Compassionate St. Augustine, the organization that has spearheaded the effort to bring Operation New Hope's first branch office to St. Augustine. She is a founder and board member of the Cyprian Center for Expressive Arts and also serves on Flagler College's Usdin Lecture Series Committee, OneJax's Interfaith Council, and the Advisory Boards of The Golden Way: Films That Make A Difference, and Compassion In Action Criminal Justice Reform.

Locally, Caren is the recipient of the Recognizing Outstanding Women in the Arts (ROWITA) Award and the 2018 Stetson Kennedy Foundation's Fellow Man and Mother Earth Award. Her career as an award-winning professional investigative and features journalist, magazine writer, and author spans over 40 years. She is the author of six nonfiction books. In 2011, her book *Restoring Life's Missing Pieces* was named a Best Spiritual Book of that year. She, Ted, and Karma and Micah, their amazing four-legged rescues and spiritual guides, have lived in St. Augustine since 2007.

"Drive all blames into one means that all the problems and the complications that exist around our practice, realization, and understanding are not somebody else's fault. All the blame always starts with ourselves." Training the mind, and cultivating loving-kindness is a teaching by Chogyam Trungpa Rinpoche. The book *Training The Mind* is used extensively by students in the lineages of Tibetan Buddhism. The fifty-nine slogans and the commentary by Rinpoche have helped Dharma students for more than eight centuries focus on the most important practices for training our minds for life and enlightenment. It is indeed liberating to understand and put into practice being our genuine selves with all that means.



Rev. Billy Thomas is currently the Dean of Social and Behavioral Sciences at Florida State College at Jacksonville, a doctoral student at the University of South Florida and, most importantly, father to Matthew, Amelia and Teddy. He has been practicing meditation and Buddhism for almost 25 years now and directs the Amelia Island Karma Kagyu Study Group in Fernandina Beach. An avid motorcyclist, he rides almost every day and when he is not on his motorcycle he enjoys kayaking.
