Sunday, December 1, 10:30 a.m. "Elizabeth Cady Stanton" Jo Anne Engelbert

Service Leader: Nana Royer Music: Taffy Rook

Unitarian Elizabeth Cady Stanton wanted far more than voting rights for women. In her day a woman had "fewer rights than a male inhabitant of an insane asylum." Stanton found the roots of inequality embedded in passages of the Bible that portrayed woman as "an inferior being, subject to men," a bias that was an integral part of Judeo-Christian tradition. In 1895, Stanton published The Woman's Bible, a collection of Bible texts with sharp, witty comments. Though written with reverence for the moral beauty of the Bible, the book shocked Victorian sensibility and produced a split within the feminist movement itself.

Jo Anne Engelbert is a long - standing member of our Fellowship. She is Professor Emerita of Montclair State University, where she taught women's studies courses within her program of Latin American Studies.

Sunday, December 8, 10:30 a.m. "Peace Corps Service – Work for the World – Work of a Lifetime" Christopher Lins and Returned Peace Corps Volunteers

The US Peace Corps website opens with the call: "Work for the World." Viewers are asked if they are inspired by hands - on, grassroots – driven projects, working side - by - side with locals to make a difference. After 58 years, how has the Peace Corps stayed relevant and inspirational? The Peace Corps' mission is to promote world peace and friendship. This overall mission fits well with the UU sixth principle of working toward a world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all.

Peace Corps recruiter Christopher Lins will discuss the current status of the Peace Corps. Several UU Returned Peace Corps Volunteers (RPCVs) will discuss how their Peace Corps service has shaped their post - Peace Corps lives of activism and community service.


Christopher Lins grew up in Gainesville, FL but attended Reed College in Portland, OR where he was a student activist; apartheid was still the law, old - growth forests were being decimated, and the US was actively involved in the destruction of Central America. After a year of backpacking through Mexico and Guatemala and upon graduation, Chris hoped to be a positive change - maker by joining the Peace Corps. He served as a Small Enterprise Development volunteer in Paraguay 1996 – 1998, mainly working with a cotton farmers cooperative. After three years in South America, Chris worked as Peace Corps Recruiter in New England. He then spent five years at the Castillo de San Marcos in St. Augustine until the call for service came again and he went to Tanzania 2014 – 2016 as a Health Extension volunteer, focusing on HIV education, but also planting 160,000 pine trees and raising bees and pigs. After six months in San Francisco working for Immigration (the good side of things), Chris returned to northeast Florida to work as a Peace Corps recruiter again.

Sunday, December 15, 10:30 a.m. "Florida Has a Water Problem" Bob Patterson

Bob will be dispensing information, both in song and word, about Florida waterways of which many folks are unaware. Bob will talk about his special education project which stresses the importance of teaching our young people about water and the environment.

Bob Patterson was a personal friend of Florida icon Gamble Rogers, and is one of the original co-founders of the Gamble Rogers Folk Festival. He has functioned as the Artistic Director for 24 years, booking acts and, creating programs, benefits, and lineups. For more than 20 years, he has produced 'The Music for the Birds Concerts', which were significant fundraisers for the HAWKE Wildlife Association. In 2011 he was awarded the 'Fellow Man and Mother Earth Award' by the Stetson Kennedy Foundation. The award recognizes performers and composers whose lives and works have reflected their concern for the environment, human rights, and traditional culture. He has served as a board member for the Florida Storytelling Association and in 2014 received a Lifetime Achievement Award.



In 1968 he signed a contract with Vanguard Records with his folk rock band, Elizabeth, and recorded his first album. That album is now #14 on the list of the Top 50 Psychedelic Bands You Should Hear Before You Die. Since those days, Bob has recorded eight albums and published two books (Forgotten Tales of Florida and Dorothy; both loaded with Florida history and folklore), he has received numerous awards for his fine art photography; was a 2019 first - place winner in the Best Florida Song Contest; has released a DVD commemorating fifty years as a performer, was nominated for a Florida Folk Heritage Award, and was inducted into the St. Augustine Music Hall of Fame.



She markets a fireplace grate for a hotter, easier fire

that her physicist father invented. Like her father, Nicole has always been involved in advocacy work, and three years ago, she co-founded Save Guana Now. The organization successfully stopped a developer from taking the first step towards development of 100 acres of conservation land, and she remains focused on protecting the property.



Programs for Children and Youth



Scorching temperatures. Rocky terrain. Hunger and thirst. Physical and emotional exhaustion. These are the things migrant families face every day as they travel through dangerous routes in search of freedom. Since the mid – 90s, the United States has employed an immigration policy the government calls "prevention through deterrence." Militarizing areas along the U.S. – Mexico border forces migrants to attempt travel through inhospitable and often deadly mountainous areas

If you have ever wondered what that journey must be like for families who are desperate to escape violence in their home country, I can tell you what I saw firsthand from being in that desert landscape for just a few days. I traveled to the southwest alongside several other activists and volunteers who participated in a UU College of Social Justice experiential learning trip to the border.

My experience showed me what it means to rely on community and require compassion. It taught the vitality of water and the importance of food. Without these things, survival is unlikely — a heartbreaking fact made evident by the remains of more than 3,000 people our partner, No More Deaths (No Más Muertes), has helped recover in the Sonora desert.

We must live out the words inscribed on the water jugs we left in the desert: *no estas solo* — you are not alone. We must band together as people of conscience during this time when rights are under attack. And we must join our voices in unison to ensure the practice of targeting acts of compassion ends.

It's more important than ever to speak truth to power, telling those who seek to undermine compassionate acts that humanitarian aid is never a crime. Please learn more and join us this week in expressing solidarity with Scott Warren and our partner No More Deaths.
