From Your President



We are now about two - thirds of the way through our fiscal year, which ends June 30th. Here is some news I would like to highlight:

Barbara Battelle reports that pledges have come in a little faster than expected, and we have already received about 90% of them, a happy circumstance.

The Religious Education program has now hired both a teacher and a childcare person, positions that have been vacant this year until now.

There is an effort underway to assess needed improvements to our facility, spearheaded by Annette Jones, working with Michael Dixon, who is a preservation architect. At the February Board of Trustees meeting we approved a land survey which will allow Michael to determine what exactly

can be done to improve the parking in the space we have available, and how many spaces we will be able to fit in once the resulting lot is striped per regulations. Improvement to the parking is a major goal, but there may be other significant improvements to both the exterior of the building and the grounds. Annette hopes to develop a plan to encompass a series of works which will include improvements to the memorial garden and restoration of the plaques which memorialize departed members. No decisions have been made to proceed with any major works, but you should expect to hear more at our Annual Congregational Meeting.

I am continually impressed with the generosity of our members toward one another. If there is some way you might benefit from a helping hand of some type, a ride to a doctor's appointment, some shopping, cooking or perhaps just some moral support, don't hesitate to reach out.

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

Can I avoid swallowing the poison in today's world, even in my personal life? Perhaps Mark's granddaughter's toddler perspective offers a clue: "Uh oh!"

Dr. Esther Hill Hawks taught black troops in the Sea Islands and Jacksonville, Florida during the Civil War. She visited St. Augustine on a pleasure trip turned dangerous, doctored the wounded after Olustee, ran a hospital and opened an integrated school for children in Jacksonville. Later, in Volusia County, she was vice president of the Equal Rights Association, and influenced Senator Purman in introducing a woman suffrage petition to the Florida Legislature.

Margaret Kaler tells the stories of historical women in first - person portrayals; these include Susan B. Anthony and Mother Jones. Margaret grew up in St. Augustine, acting with the Little Theater here. She studied theater at the University of Florida, did graduate work at Florida State University, and worked with the Asolo Theater Repertory Company. She has recently worked locally with Rising Tide Productions, and A Classic Theater.

Sunday, March 15, 10:30 a.m. "Liberation and Self-Knowledge: Fruits of Feminist Thought" Jeffrey Nall, Ph.D.

Dr. Nall contends we cannot uproot sexism without a deeper appreciation and understanding of the core insights of our feminist foremothers. In this talk, Dr. Nall, adjunct instructor of Women, Gender and Sexuality Studies at Florida Atlantic University, illustrates the meaning and value of fundamental feminist precepts including the distinction between sex and gender and the notion that the personal is political. More than denouncing inequality, feminist thought reveals how common-sense thinking, shaped by thousands of years of patriarchal culture, undermines the goal of equality between men and women. As we celebrate one hundred years of women's suffrage in the United States, we should also pay tribute to the fruits of self-knowledge and liberation feminist thought continues to bear.



Jeffrey Nall, Ph.D. is an engaged citizen, father, and professor. He teaches philosophy and humanities courses for Indian River State College and the University of Central Florida. "One of the hardest parts of my job is not being able to turn off. I was organizing years before I even knew it was a thing. Who doesn't want to fix something that is affecting their life, right? I've always been that person with whom strangers share their business in the checkout line. It's a gift I've inherited from my mom. The one thing I wasn't prepared for was the fact that now I see inequity just about everywhere, whether it is socioeconomic status, race, or gender, to name but a few. I understand the meaning of "woke" more than I ever thought I would. Granted, it's become a joke in certain circles of mine, but the truth is that I am awakening."



Amy Jo Hutchison is a lifelong West Virginian whose lived experience has been poverty. Her greatest work is her daughters, despite the struggles of raising them alone. Her own experience feeds her passion for organizing poor folks, especially single moms, throughout West Virginia. She previously served as tri-chair with the WV Poor People's Campaign and spoke at national events. Most of her work has focused on organizing to protect the safety net, particularly SNAP benefits. Her experience has provided her the opportunity to testify before Congress to describe how poverty affects children and families, and the need to update poverty guidelines. She is an ordained minister, and proud graduated fellow with the WV Trainers Project through Training For Change.

When Amy testified before Congress last month, Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez told her, "Your story has filled this entire room. You have been one of the most powerful witnesses I have ever seen in my short time here in Congress. Your testimony, I hope, will move and change the tide of how we treat poverty in this country."

What does it mean to be a man in the day and age of "toxic masculinity?" In this sermon we will explore answers to this question, consider new definitions of "manhood," and examine the possibility of ridding ourselves of the notion of "masculinity" altogether.

Phillip Baber is the former pastor of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Jacksonville. He is also a former co-president of I.C.A.R.E., the Jacksonville-based Interfaith Coalition for Action, Reconciliation, and Empowerment. Phillip's ministry is dedicated to the advancement of our collective liberation, leading him to advocate in support of criminal justice reform, police accountability, racial and economic justice, justice for refugees and immigrants, and LGBTQIA+ rights. Phillip's faith calls him to boldly declare that Black Lives Matter, No Human is Illegal, and Women's Rights are Human Rights.

Programs for Children and Youth



Our February **Story for All Ages**, read to the congregation in the sanctuary by our children, was "The Little Red Hen." It is an old story that reminds all of us about the importance of working together. To quote the Little Red Hen: "For after all is said and done, working together makes working fun." And our children practice that idea in their classes, as we should throughout our Fellowship.



In honor of Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday, we discussed with our children the importance of children in the civil rights movement of the 1960s, and we emphasized the wisdom in the title of Greta Thunburg's book: **No one is too small to make a difference.** The children were challenged to make signs expressing the ideas they would be willing to take to the streets and march for. They were not shy about expressing their ideas. We need to listen!!







February's "Share the Plate" charity selection for the past few years has been our **Children's Choice**. This choice is something our teachers and the children take very seriously, because we are asking the members of our congregation to donate to a charity that our children select. The children brought to their class a list of charities they might ask our congregation to support, they discussed what these charities do, and then, using the democratic process, they selected one. This year our **Children's Choice** is the **Homeless Coalition of St. Johns County.** They selected this organization because of the



work they do to support families with children and to assist homeless children. Did you know that during the last school year, there were nearly 800 homeless children in St. Johns County Public Schools? Our children recognize that some of their classmates may be homeless, and they are asking all of us to help.

Finally, it is with great joy that we welcome Virginia (Vee) Coulter to our teaching staff! Vee is primarily responsible for teaching pre-school children and, whenever possible, she will assist Kelly Sommer in teaching the school-aged children. Welcome Vee!

Remember the dental recycle box – there are stickers all over it – you can't miss it. We're collecting used-up toothpaste tubes, boxes in which they are packaged, used floss containers, and toothbrushes. Colgate has a contract with Terracycle, which makes them into other products.

We also showed the film, *The Need to GROW* on Thursday, Feb. 20. It's the inspiring story of solutions to our deteriorating soils. If we fail to switch to a regenerative, decentralized network of local food ecosystems, if we don't proactively restore our greatest carbon sink (soil), if we don't empower people with the tools needed to participate in this cultural and technological transformation, quite simply, the world cannot sustain very much human life. Luckily, positive change is already happening. This is a story of the pioneers of those solutions.

By the time this Quest is published, there will have been another Litter Gitter cruise completed. Adam Morley's litter cruise seems to be popular, so we'll be arranging another one in the near future.

If you have kitchen scraps and you do not compost yourself, please deposit them in the compost bin near the rear of the building, to the north. We welcome all vegetable and fruit scraps, coffee grounds, egg shells, just not animal (meat) products that would attract varmints. You could keep a small container in your kitchen to accumulate scraps and/or put them in a plastic bag which you keep in the freezer. Let's try and keep the cycle back to earth going! We empty the black bin into a pile next to it for further breakdown and then use it on vegetation on the Fellowship grounds.


