From Your President



Dear Members and Friends,

Is there such a thing as a "calling" beyond the domain of a career? Might not the practice of a calling also provide a special lens for performing daily, short-term acts? Since most of our acts fall into this realm, we'd have far more chances to cultivate such qualities as presence, passion, awareness, and curiosity – ones we ascribe to a calling. As in the practice of a calling, quotidian acts, too, can elicit focus and intent, thereby becoming intensified and enriched with meaning.

Might we not elevate any task or job we undertake at the Fellowship by considering it as a short-term calling? Noticing that

paper towels need replacing in the restroom and replacing them ... why not?! This small act shows caring, sensitivity to a need and answering its call. Ever-tuning ourselves to the needs of the moment – whether in one's home, the UUFSA, or the larger community – simple acts, viewed from our faith tradition of love and respect, call us to act and respond.

And we do. Dining with Dignity, the Food Pantry. Our regular presence at these activities says we are present, that we are willing to share ourselves, our gifts. Thus we live in harmony, whether with the "divine" – as in our Spoken Covenant – with our conscience, or with the stirrings of a compassionate heart. As Pastor Baber has noted, "service" is the only word mentioned twice in our Spoken Covenant: "service is our prayer," and "to serve humanity in Fellowship." For me, this service is also guided by our Seven Principles and rooted in our Six Sources.

Called to serve, we're fortified against the undermining voices of fear and doubt. Since service is not about what others think about me, my ego can relax! I'm free to ask: How may I serve, How may I help you? Rather than being a constraint or diminishment, serving becomes a path to liberation and meaning.

Maybe I should have been a preacher, but I'm happy and grateful to be your president!



In this talk Jeffrey Nall, Ph.D. explores how representations of Hollywood movies, professional sports leagues, and the wider popular culture distort the public's understanding of veterans' experiences. Nall contends that flippant and perfunctory affirmation of and "thanks" for military service takes too much for granted and is no substitute for genuine consideration of the harms of war. To honor veterans, particularly combat veterans, we need to take time to understand the moral complexities of their service and take responsibility for electing leaders who send them to war, in the first place.

Jeffrey Nall, Ph.D., teaches philosophy and humanities courses for Indian River State College and the University of Central Florida. Nall also teaches courses in Florida Atlantic University's Women, Gender, and Sexuality Studies department. He recently began a Substack newsletter, "Humanities in Revolt," which can be found at JeffreyNall.substack.com
