#### **From Your President**



Dear Members and Friends,

At our May 15<sup>th</sup> Sunday Service something very unusual happened. Pastor Baber was scheduled to give the Raffle-a-Sermon talk on Star Wars. Instead, he asked us to face a tragedy – the murder of 10 black persons – in this country. He read details from a news account to show why he could not simply carry on as usual. Courageously, he responded to his heart and led us in a congregational conversation to confront this tragedy.

To the despair that was voiced, he passionately recalled us to the hope our faith makes possible. Fearlessly, we spoke our truths to each other and listened to Phillip's responses. The interplay of our

voices created a spontaneous "call and response," weaving our community more closely together. We faced this present tragedy grounded in our faith. Rooted in its foundational principles, I knew we would continue to oppose hatred, ignorance, and fear. We are a loving, ethical congregation, "singing for our lives."

For me, that song turned joyous as we completed the business of our annual meeting – the springtime renewal of commitment to our Fellowship. Let's celebrate the numbers: nearly half of our members attended, double the number needed for a quorum! Your acceptance of agenda items, so carefully and thoughtfully prepared by dedicated volunteers, was by acclamation, 100%! Could you have sent a stronger message to me and our outgoing Board that we fulfilled our responsibility to represent and guide our Fellowship?

If I may speak on behalf of our new Board: we will make the same effort to serve you next year, to listen to you, to create with you as we work together to sustain and build our community. Let us ever be a loving, ethical congregation, "singing for our lives," in duets, trios, choruses ... resolving dissonance into harmony, ever learning to tune ourselves to the moment and its needs, to the future and its possibilities.

## **Programs for Children and Youth**




**Kellough**. The planting ceremony was led by **Cal Marshall** who provided a blessing from the indiginous people of the American Southwest. He was joined by parents, other members and our young people.

The final focus of our children's classes for the current congregational year is animals. So far, they have learned about two local endangered species. By reading this





close and personal with a variety of live, local marine invertebrates through a visit from **The Traveling Zoo** from **UF's Whitney Lab.**They touched, held and asked a million questions about the seastars, sea urchins, sea cucumbers, conch, welks, hermit crabs and horseshoe crabs in the zoo. Afterwards,








they shared what they discovered with other members of the Fellowship. Their final class, presented by **Claudia Atkins**, focused on Ladybugs, a beautiful and very important insect.

Our young people also remembered the cats and dogs in our homes, very important members of families. They learned from the Humane Society that many families are

struggling to purchase food for their pets, so our **Enchanting Activists** have lauched a pet food and fund-raising drive for the local humane society.
