From Your President



Dear Members and Friends,

Hurricane season started early this year as the 2023 legislative session unleashed the full malevolence of its destructive force. With one egregious bill after another, passed or proposed, we've been called to withstand the gale psychologically, and to gather our resources for the repair of damages sustained.

In the wake of disaster, whether from human or natural causes, we feel sadness and anger, sensitive to the harm that will result. In the face of political power that thwarts human dignity and flourishing, we are called to respond. What actions can we take?

Philanthropic actions of compassionate citizens and charitable organizations assist victims of economic and political injustice. Participating in Dining with Dignity and the Food Pantry, we help to ameliorate society's failures. Efforts to change the undergirding structures of the status quo also continue. In the coming months, our congregation, in solidarity with the larger community, will try to deal with the newly passed voter suppression laws.

As Unitarian Universalists, our search for meaning goes beyond the boundaries set by a materialist consumer-driven society. It must, if we are to "affirm and promote" the Principles of our faith, such as "Justice, equity, and compassion in human relations." In closing, I appeal to you with a metaphor of solace and courage: the green grass. Like you, it grows and expresses a vital, life energy. It also regrows, after the lawn mower cuts it down. As Joseph Campbell says about this cycle: "Suppose the grass were just to think, Ah, shucks, what's all the fuss about? I quit!"

We are the grass, and we grow in the fertile, nutrient-rich soil of our UUFSA community. When wounded by the hurricanes of political backlash, we come first to the aid of ourselves, soothing our hearts with empathy and kindness, and then, to the aid of one another, listening and comforting the pain that attends our loss. Healed enough, we encourage and support a renewed effort. The work is ongoing, the grass is growing!





In this 3-part sermon miniseries, Phillip will interrogate the wisdom of Zen Master Thich Nhat Hanh's 1995 book, *Living Buddha, Living Christ*. TNH is recognized as a major influence on Western Buddhism, the father of "mindfulness," and originator of "engaged Buddhism." In this series, we will consider the opportunities and dangers represented in his understanding of the ongoing dialogue between Christianity and Buddhism. On the first Sunday in April, our young people presented a moving story about slavery in America titled "An American Story." If you missed it, it is worth a listen. You can find it in the archives on our website. Click this link and then scroll down: 2023 Sunday Programs (uufsa.org)

In their classes, our students continued learning from the Riddles and Mysteries Curriculum from the UUA's Tapestry of Faith and address big questions such as: "Why do bad things happen?" and "Is life fair?" In keeping with UU tradition and philosophy, we focus on the questions. The lessons are designed to help students explore in different ways their own answers to the questions. In addition, students watched an episode of "The Simpsons," in which Bart sells his soul. As usual, this episode prompted great discussions focused on the nature of the soul. What is it?

While our older students explore big questions with Jindy or Barbara, younger students can explore their own interests and questions through creative play with Ayler.

The children will present the last Story for All Ages for this Congregational Year on the first Sunday in May and participate in the food collection on the third Sunday. Since public schools close for the summer mid-May, and most of our young people and their families take advantage of the summer break to travel and for new adventures, our last formal class for young people will be at the end of May. Nevertheless, members of the Fellowship will be available through the end of June to work informally with any young people who attend.

We Need this Amendment!

UU Justice Florida supports the proposed Amendment to the Florida Constitution, establishing the Right to Clean and Healthy Water.

When 80% of our springs are contaminated by excessive nitrogen, 9,000 miles of our estuaries, streams and rivers are contaminated with fecal bacteria, and when bluegreen algae blooms are becoming the "new normal." linked to neurodegenerative diseases, it is clear that litigation is not working. The laws have become "permits to pollute."

This citizens' initiative is the only way forward for our peninsula to continue to function with good water quality and quantity. Those who know call this a "911 issue."

According to environmental attorney Jane West, "Litigation isn't working. Lobbying isn't working. My personal opinion is that this is the only way forward. Without meaningful action on this amendment, I don't see how the peninsula is going to continue to function with good water quality and quantity moving forward."

Excerpt from the Young George Washington's Rules of Civility & Decent Behaviour in Company and Conversation

Every action done in company ought to be with some sign of respect to those that are present.

When in company, put not your hands to any part of the body not usually discovered.

Shew nothing to your friend that may affright him.

In the presence of others, sing not to yourself with a humming noise, nor drum with your fingers or feet.

If you cough, sneeze, sigh or yawn, do it not loud but privately; and speak not in your yawning, but put your handkerchief or hand before your face and turn aside.

Put not off your clothes in the presence of others, nor go out your chamber half drest. When you sit down, keep your feet firm and even, without putting one on the other or crossing them.

Shake not the head, feet or legs, rowl not the eyes, lift not one eyebrow higher than the other, wry not the mouth, and bedew no man's face with your spittle by approaching too near him when you speak.

Do not puff up the cheeks, loll not out the tongue, rub the hands or beard, thrust out the lips, or bite them or keep the lips too open or too close.

Kill no vermin as fleas, lice, ticks, etc. in the sight of others; if you see any filth or thick spittle, put your foot dexterously upon it; if it be upon the clothes of your companions, put it off privately, and if it be upon your own clothes, return thanks to him who puts it off.
